Supervision as Disciplinary Work (Complexity of HES as a field of study)

Relatively new field of study

- Contested understandings of HE
- Researchers drawn from other disciplines (mostly) practitioner-based research
- Drawing theories and methodologies from sociology and anthropology
- Specialist journals (some located in other disciplines)

International issues

- Students need to understand local, regional and international contexts
 - Different terms, different institutional structures, different histories
- Range of issues affecting HES on a global scale (the pandemic, international students, transformation & decolonisation, funding, etc.)


